very once in a while an interior design trend comes along and disrupts the way we have been creating spaces – enter maximalism. "Maximalism is the art of more – more personality, more layers, more story," says Renthea Geyer, owner of House of Interiors, adding that "it is an unapologetic celebration of colour, texture, pattern and personal expression". Where minimalism finds beauty in restrain, maximalism finds richness in curation, she explains.

#### THE CORE PRINCIPLES

It is important to understand the principles that shape the maximalism design trend to achieve the desired look. "Maximalism celebrates individuality, storytelling and freedom from minimal restrain," explains the design team at Maldini. "At its heart, it is about creating a space that feels rich with meaning, style and visual interest," they add.

The curated design team at Olala Interiors further add that maximalism is rooted in self-expression, confidence and curation. "It embraces the idea that more can be more, but with intention." They also highlight the eclectic mixing of eras and >











styles and a fearless use of pattern, materiality and decorative layering as key principles.

Vinette Diab Nicholls, owner, founder and head designer at Giava Interiors, adds that maximalism is not about perfection.

### **CREATE A RHYTHM**

Apart from storytelling, maximalism is also about soul and joy. "If you are feeling stuck, start small – maybe that extra scatter cushion or a statement occasional chair – and let your home evolve organically. Most importantly, have fun with it because your home should make you smile every time you walk in."

### WHERE TO START

If you are considering creating an interior inspired by maximalism design, **Sipho Phiri, managing director at GLE Interiors,** outlines his process to help you get started. "I begin with the walls, mirrors, artwork or murals that set the tone. From there, I would move on to window treatments like layered drapery, followed by floor coverings such as Persian rugs. Then comes furniture – carefully selected and placed. Finally, I will complete the space with ornaments, soft cushions and lighting – think table lamps with dramatic shades and sculptural details."

smallest detail. "Since patterns are a large feature in a maximalist room and can be quite overwhelming to the senses, it is important to strike a balance between variety and visual cohesion," explains Bulelwa Jordan-Tati, founder of Urban Blend Interiors. "For example, several patterns may be at play within a particular space, but they shouldn't compete with one another or appear too busy together. Using neutral spaces between them can allow the eye to rest before moving on to the next point of

Bridget Meier, owner and lead designer of Styleast Design and Décor, also suggests bringing balance through the repetition of elements and playing with scale and proportions to strike that balance and ensure the space doesn't feel overwhelming.

According to Wanda Michelle Hadlow, executive manager at Vérelüxe Interior Design & Décor, you should also establish a unifying colour palette, create focal points and layer with intent.

On the importance of a colour palette, she says: "Even in a room with many patterns and textures, a consistent colour scheme (or dominant tones) creates harmony. Repeating certain hues across textiles, walls and accessories ties everything together." >

#### **TELLING YOUR STORY**

Maximalism is strongly tied to creating spaces that tell your personal and unique story. **Jennifer Jones, owner of Jennifer Jones Interiors,** explains how storytelling shapes the maximalism trends. "I have, throughout my career, loved working with people whose homes tell the story of the rich fabric of their lives. From vintage furniture to collectable cars, books to family photographs, every piece in a home forms part of a story and this is where maximalism, or variations of it, have a place – to showcase those stories well, to combine unusual elements offset with gorgeous colour and bring a light-hearted playfulness into a space – making it a happy space! After all, isn't that what our homes are meant to be – a joyful personal extension of ourselves and our families?"



#### **INSPIRED COLOURS AND MATERIALS**

Bright and bold colours stand out when creating a maximalist space and for Sandrine Fanchette, co-owner of Roche Bobois (South Africa and Mauritius), mixing styles, shapes and textures is a must. "Opt for bright, bold and shiny colours but don't hesitate to combine them with more neutral hues to balance the space." Johann De Waal, marketing manager at KARE Johannesburg, says there is a resurgence of jewel tones, velvets, highgloss lacquers and playful patterns clashing – floral with animal prints, stripes with baroque. "Brass and gold accents are making a big comeback, adding a touch of glamour and warmth. Organic shapes, surrealist motifs and bold graphic art are also trending," explains De Waal. \(\bar{n}\)

- Ignore scale keep your furniture and accessories in proportion.
- Forget functionality beautiful spaces should still be livable.

- Follow trends blindly this style is deeply personal.
